ArcGIS 10 – Contemplation of Deprecation

In June 2010, ESRI will release a new version of their software, [version 10](#), which contains some significant changes. This article will address just one of those changes, the removal of support for Visual Basic 6 (VB6) and Visual Basic for Applications (VBA), and the proposed replacements for this technology (Microsoft has stopped or will soon stop supporting these technologies, so ESRI is following suit).

What's possible now.

VB6 and VBA can be used in the current version of ArcGIS Desktop (9.3.1) to customize how the Desktop application looks and works. It can add functionality beyond the stock functions in ArcMap. On the simpler side, [VBA can be used to create customized editing tools, buttons, or toolbars](#). These are similar to macros you may be familiar with in Microsoft Word or Excel. They can be developed within ArcGIS, can be stored and distributed in an ArcMap document, and are relatively simple to create.

For more advanced applications, [VB6 is used to create custom components](#) for ArcGIS Desktop software using [ArcObjects](#). VB6 requires development outside of ArcGIS (in Microsoft Visual Studio), compiling source code, and distribution via an installation/setup program. An example of this is ESRI's own [Production Line Tool Set \(PLTS\)](#).

What's next?

ESRI has stated that it [will not support VB6](#) beyond the current version (9.3.1), and [will not support VBA](#) beyond version 10. So this begs the question, "What's next?" While I have not yet used the new version, I perceive as good news the addition of new development options for non-programmers like me.

For new advanced applications that would have been built in VB6, ESRI encourages developing new applications using ArcObjects in [Visual C++](#), [.NET](#), or [Java](#). These are appropriate for extending the functionality of ArcGIS to suit a particular project or effort, and are newer technologies not likely to go away anytime soon.

For simpler applications, it looks like [Python](#) may be the best choice. ESRI will be including new functionality allowing the use of Python scripting directly in ArcMap (similar to VBA). [Python scripting](#) can also take advantage of newer ArcToolbox functionality, allowing manipulation of map documents and lyr files (modify data sources, etc.) While the details of these new functions are not clear yet, ESRI states that Python scripting is more appropriate for automating complicated repetitive tasks, while other programming languages should be used for further extending the functionality of ArcGIS.

Although it appears that not all current VBA functionality will be available through Python, some exciting new features have been promoted on the ESRI website, including the ability to automate the creation of a map book (a set of maps for a given area, including an overview map) and incorporating [Python scripts in a Map Document into a web service](#) through ArcGIS Server.

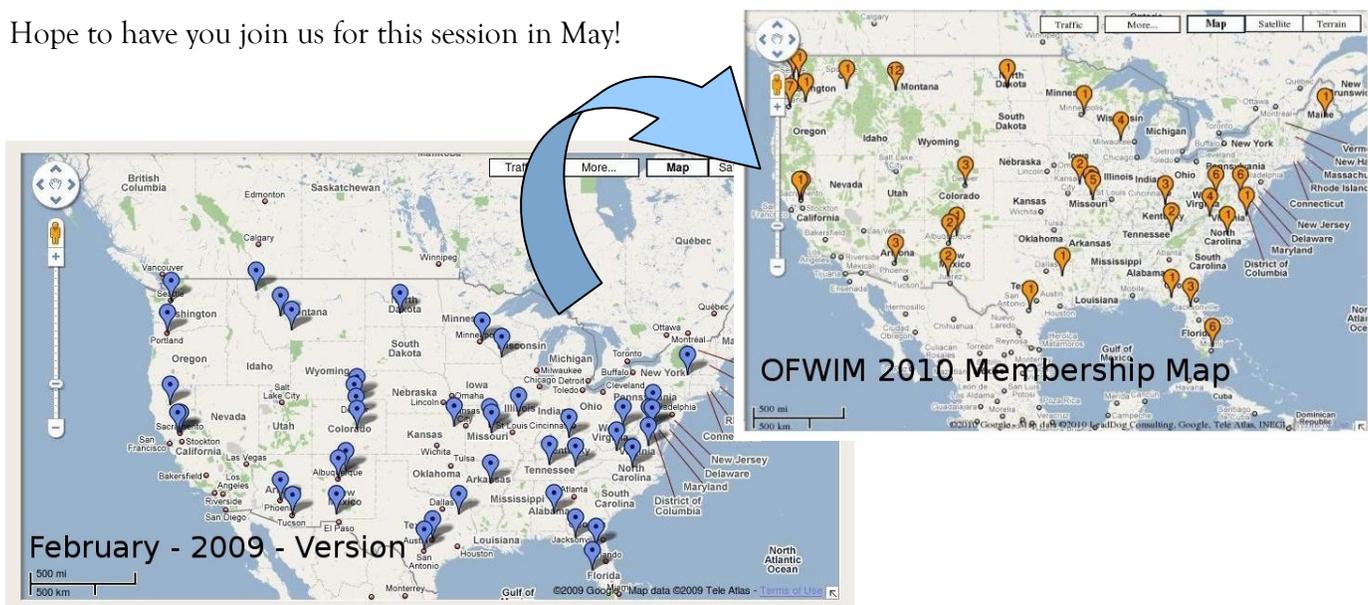
Description:

In February of 2009 an OFWIM Membership Map was created via a GoogleMaps KML file. Geographic locations for both Individual and Organizational memberships were shown with the same symbology. Free Webinar from USGS:
Estimation of Population Change From Survey Data
Webinar, Monday-Friday, May 3-7, 1:00-3:30 ET

The USGS is offering a free short course to assist resource managers in estimating population change from monitoring surveys of natural resources. The course will be presented by live web broadcasts and is open to all who are interested.

Information needs for management have become increasingly focused in recent years. Information on population status is needed for assessing management outcomes in adaptive management, and monitoring data are often used in the development of models that predict change in populations as a consequence of both management and uncontrolled environmental change. New statistical approaches for estimation of population change and modeling environmental influences on population change help meet these information needs. Generalized linear models provide a wide variety of approaches based on realistic assumptions, and hierarchical models fit using Bayesian methods permit analyses that accommodate multiple geographic scales. The course will contain an introduction to the concepts of estimation of population change, a description of example surveys used for estimation of change, summaries of several approaches used to estimate change, and examples of analyses for the approaches. We will present methods of estimating and controlling for differences in detectability to avoid biased estimates. Links to software to be used are:

Many different approaches exist for analysis of population change from survey data, and this course draws on the authors' experiences in analyzing bird survey data from surveys ranging in scale from refuge to continental. The course will provide an overview of some widely used approaches, and example analyses will use public domain software.
